The Storm Cat Career Development Award, funded by Mrs. Hamilton, has funded 26 PhD candidates at 13 universities in direct salary supplements to individuals pursuing careers in equine research since 2006.

Ambassador Earle Mack, who is an active participant in Thoroughbred racing and breeding for more than 50 years, created the Dinny Phipps Award in 2017 in memory of Phipps to honor those who have demonstrated dedication to equine health.



The Storm Cat Career Development Award

Quietly in 2006, member of the board of directors Mrs. Lucy Young Hamilton awarded the first Storm Cat Career Development award of \$15,000. The success of the program since that first year has paid big dividends with 26 PhD candidates at 13 universities receiving this award, providing \$425,000 in direct salary supplements to individuals pursuing careers in equine research. Currently, 86% of the award winners are active in equine research, and the award has blossomed to \$25,000 annually. Many winners are now funded principal investigators and serve on our Research Advisory Committee. The success of this groundbreaking program has paid dividends to the research community and encouraged the studies of the individual winners.

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“Receiving the Storm Cat Award was pivotal in supporting early, evidence-based research in equine rehabilitation -an area where objective data was desperately needed. The funding allowed me to initiate foundational studies that helped establish scientific support for rehabilitation techniques and the use of therapeutic modalities. It also fostered my spirit of inquiry and helped define the trajectory of my research career, leading to a dedicated focus on equine rehabilitation and objective gait analysis. This award truly served as the foundation for a line of investigation that has continued to expand in both scope and impact.”
