Proposed Strategic Plan

6. **Issue:** Continuing education for those who work with horses

Recommended Actions for Consideration by Potentially Responsible Parties:

Licensing requirements of trainers, grooms, jockeys, exercise riders, veterinarians and farriers should include written and hands-on exams

Require continuing education for license renewal

Why Continuing Education is Important

- Lameness is the major cause of horse wastage in horse racing and performance sports
 - ~3% of horses leave racing every month
 - \$40-98 million in horses lost nationwide every month
- Catastrophic bone fractures cause 80% of racehorse deaths
 - 90% of catastrophic fractures are caused by pre-existing injuries
- Most jockey injuries and deaths are due to falls of horses that sustained catastrophic injurim



Continuing Education Model Rules:

ARCI-008-020 Trainers

Eligibility...

Beginning no later than January 31, 2012, in order to maintain a current license, trainers must complete at least four (4) hours per calendar year of continuing education courses approved by the ARCI or the commission in that jurisdiction

CHRB DRAFT CONTINUING EDUCATION RULE (1503.5) FOR TRAINERS AND ASSISTANT TRAINERS

1503.5 (a) As of January 1, 201X, in order to maintain a current license, trainers and assistant trainers must complete at least four (4) hours per calendar year of continuing education courses approved by the board. Trainers who are not domiciled in California and have 12 of fewer starts in California during the previous 12 months may request a waiver from the stewards.
